Health Tips for Going Back to School

Backpack Safety

A new school year brings not only new aspirations and dreams but also new risks for injuries. Did you know that according to the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission (CPSC), about 7,500 children under the age of 19 are treated in the emergency department for backpack-related injuries each year? These injuries can also occur with our college faculty and students!

While that number is high, there are three tips we can follow to recognize and prevent injuries in ourselves and others.

Tip #1: Keep it Light

A general guideline is to never carry more than 15-20% of your body weight in a backpack. Additionally, only taking essential items required for that day is recommended. Using a locker to hold any extra material and making trips as needed will help prevent injuries and pain from excessive strain. Similarly, finding and using a lightweight backpack can also help reduce the total amount of weight carried. All in all – the right bag is a light bag.

Tip #2: Distribute the Weight

Understandably, it is not always possible to keep it light; therefore, we must distribute the weight appropriately. It is best to ensure heavier items are low and towards the center of the backpack to maintain balance and prevent tipping. Also, remember to organize and use the backpack's compartments to distribute the weight better. In sum, put heavier books and items closer to the back and lighter things closer to the front.

Tip #3: Keep it Close

Distributing the weight and keeping the bag closer to the back allows less energy and effort by the wearer. This can be achieved by using and tightening both straps of the backpack. Having or using only one backpack strap cannot distribute weight evenly, leading to posture problems and pain. Similarly, a bag with a waist strap will help bring it closer to the body. Backpacks should not dangle more than 4 inches below the low back as that can cause spinal misalignment and pain.

Bonus Tips

It is ideal to use a backpack with padding and wider straps. Narrow straps on a bag can dig into shoulders, generate unnecessary pressure points, and restrict circulation, causing injury and pain. Wider straps will feel more comfortable and distribute the weight more evenly. Similarly, a padded back can protect against sharp edges of books and other items from poking into the back and causing unnecessary pain.

In sum, a proper backpack meets the tips above, is easy to put on and take off, and allows free movement of the arms. If any of the above is not possible, then it is recommended to use a rolling backpack. Similarly, we recommended using a crossbody bag as an alternative to carrying books or supplies to prevent unnecessary and uneven pressure on muscles only on one side of the body. Lastly, remember to use proper body mechanics by bending the knees when lifting/picking up the backpack.

Inland Empire Desert Regional Consortium (IEDRC) investsin responsive short-term training to upskill residents andinvest in local businesses. This year, IEDRC invested \$184,000 providing customized skills for participants to gainemployment with local businesses.
